Development Hypothesis

•If agricultural productivity and nutrition practices are improved, and if environmental services are maintained, reliable electricity supply is improved, local governance of resources is ensured, and the business policy environment is enhanced, then local populations will be more food secure, with improved nutrition, and play a larger role in an expanding economy.

Longer Term Expectations (to the end of 2017)

- Agriculture: 20% reduction prevalence of poverty in the North (22% at baseline to 18% in 2017)
 - Improved competitiveness of key agricultural commodity value chains
 - Availability of key technologies for small holder farmers increased
 - Private sector investment in agriculture catalyzed
- Nutrition: 20% reduction in stunting, wasting, & anemia
 - Improved nutrition leading to decreased number of underweight, wasted or stunted children
- NRM: Sustainable management of marine and coastal natural resources; improved governance and advocacy for sustainable NRM
- Energy: Up to 1000 megawatts of new power generation

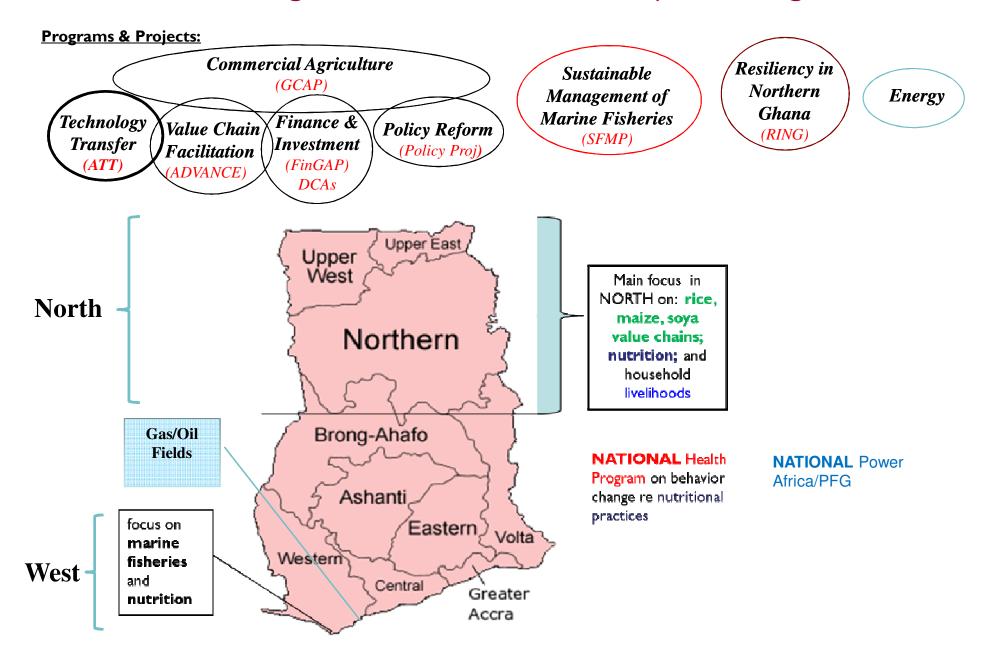

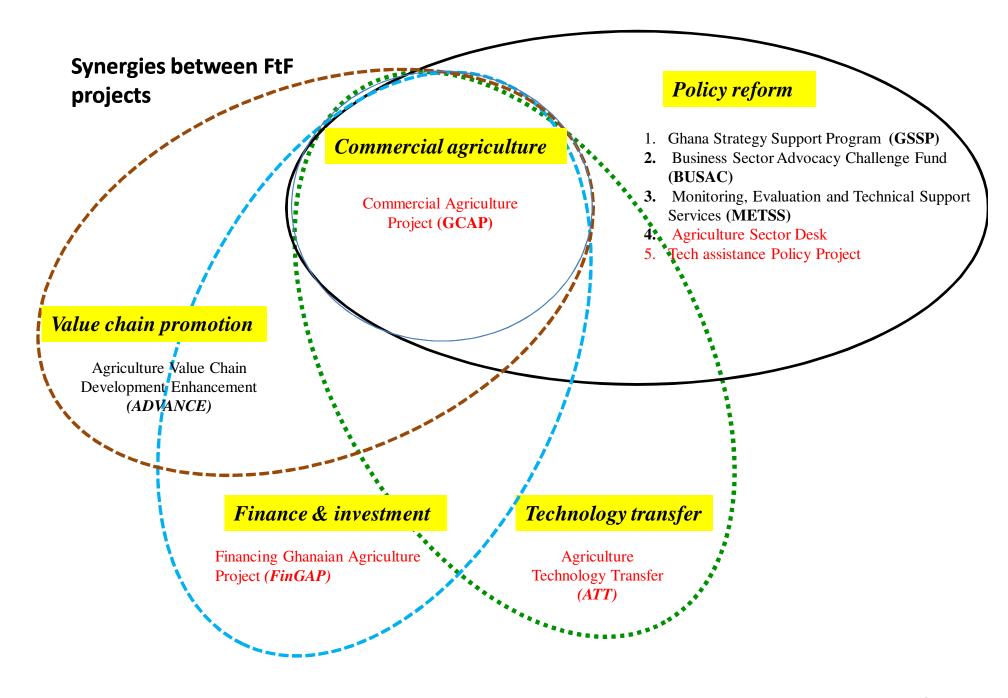
